- Emperor Claudius began to invade Britain in AD43.
- The Romans originally came from the city of Rome in Italy.
- 15,000 Roman soldiers were ordered to guard Hadrian's wall.
- The Romans built the first towns in Britain.
- Stone and brick were used to build the towns.
- A good amount of ruins of Roman towns can still be seen today.
- The three largest Roman towns were London, Colchester and St Albans.
- During the games, gladiators were paired up to fight each other or wild animals such as lions or bears.
- Gladiators were mostly slaves, criminals, prisoners of war, soldiers who didn't show bravery, or Christians.
- The gladiatorial games were provided by the wealthy to the ordinary people who lived and worked in the towns.
